Four Local Boy Scouts Honored

On July 18, 2009 Boy Scouts, Michael A. Pressler, Michael Joseph Mont, James Anthony Zock, and Preston Joseph Perry, of Troop 386 in Montgomery NY were honored at a special court of honor ceremony at the Brick Church, for achieving the highest honor in Boy Scouts, The Eagle Award.

Michael A. Pressler, on his way to becoming an eagle Scout, earned 22 merit badges and served as an Assistant Senior Patrol Leader. For his project, Michael took on a project that Village Historian, Marion Wild, recommended to the Village Board. The site for his project was at Veterans Park. At the intersection of Bachelor Street and Tice Road stood an overgrown lot. All brush was cleared and a rock wall was constructed. The property was back filled, leveled and covered with mulch, thus beautifying the entrance to a section of the park. Michael has recently graduated from Valley Central High School and is attending the University of Buffalo in the fall.

To become an Eagle Scout, Michael Joseph Mont earned 26 merit badges and served the troop in various leadership positions, including Assistant Patrol Leadership and Junior Assistant Scoutmaster. He also completed an Eagle Scout project dedicating over 100 hours of service to his community by

constructing a book case for the Village Museum to store and preserve old ledgers which date back to the 1800s and some books from the military during the Civil War. Michael has recently graduated from Valley Central High School. He also serves his parish, St. Mary's Church in Washingtonville, as an altar server for the past nine years. This fall, Michael will be attending SUNY Orange pursuing a degree in Business Administration.

To become an Eagle Scout, James Anthony Zock earned 21 merit badges and served the troop as patrol leader. He also completed a major community service project of repairing and painting fences, planting flowering trees and creating a memorial garden of perennial plants for the Village Museum. James is an eighth grade honor roll student and member of the National Honor Society. Since he is only 14 years old, he plans to

continue his scouting experience and work toward his Eagle Palms. After High School, he wants to go to the Air Force Academy and become a military pilot.

To become an Eagle Scout, Preston Joseph Perry earned 24 merit badges and served the troop in various leadership positions including Assistant Senior Patrol leader, Senior Patrol Leader, and Junior Assistant Scout Master. He also completed an Eagle Scout project dedication 100 hours of service to the community by constructing a hand-crafted directional sign out of cedar and landscaping the area in the Pleasure Ground Park. Preston recently graduated from Valley Central High School where he participated in varsity football and lacrosse. He is a Certified BSA Lifeguard. This fall, Preston will be attending Hofstra University pursuing a degree in Engineering.



Antique Shaving Mugs to be Displayed at Village Hall

Years ago there was a time when shaving was more of a chore than it is today. Hot water was not available from the tap, so often the water had to be pumped from a well, boiled on a wood-burning kitchen stove, and then carried to the bathroom - and then one had to shave with poor lighting.

However, if you could afford the 10 cent cost, you could go to a barber shop, relax while reading, meet friends and get a professional shave with hot towels and your own shaving mug and soap. This period, from about 1870, was a time when changes were rapidly taking place throughout the country. The industrial revolution was creating new jobs and many unique products. Immigrants were arriving from diverse countries to fill jobs and bring new skills.

Almost every man owned a shaving mug, either at home, or at his

barbershop. Shaving mugs also were a status symbol for barbers and customers as well.

A shaving mug is a device used during a wet shave, when using a shaving brush and soap. The mug is traditionally used to hold the block of soap, and to build the lather up while using the brush. However, it can also be used with soft shaving creams and soaps.

Typically made of ceramic, it often looks like a standard mug. Some also have a built-in brush rest, so the brush does not sit in lather.

The shaving mugs will be on display at the Village Hall and were donated to the Village of Montgomery thanks to Phil DeLessio, a long-standing respected member of our community where he has operated his barbershop for over fifty years. Prior to Phil's Barber Shop,

Ralph Broas operated the barbershop also for fifty years as well, (A total of over 100 years!)

The display cabinet was made from the original shelves used to store the mugs in the barbershop.

Montgomery Village Museum News

On Saturday, May 23rd, 2009, Montgomery Village Historian Marion Wild hosted a memorial ceremony for Montgomery native, Robert F. Starbuck. Bobby, as he was known, graduated from our high school, now Montgomery Elementary, and he enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps where he quickly became a model marine, having been named the top recruit in his basic training company at Parris Island where he would later become a drill instructor. Bob Starbuck influenced the lives of many young soldiers, instilling in them a sense of responsibility and duty that those recruits would need to serve our country as proud

marines. On February 3, 1967, Bob Starbuck was killed in action as he exposed himself to heavy gunfire while acting to save members of the night recon squad that he commanded. Bob Starbuck's parents received the Silver Star award that their son was awarded, posthumously, for his bravery. The citation read: By his courage, aggressive fighting spirit and steadfast devotion to duty in the face of extreme personal danger, Sergeant Starbuck upheld the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country. Home Town: Montgomery, New York

During the Montgomery Village ceremony, Marion Wild and members of the Historical Montgomery

Association unveiled a memorial plaque for Bob and demonstrated a visual display of pictures and testaments about Bob Starbuck's life. The ceremony was well attended by area residents, members of local veterans organizations, including the American Legion and VFW. Several Marine friends of Bob Starbuck also attended. A VFW color guard fired a 21-gun salute to Sergeant Starbuck and everyone sang God Bless America. After the ceremony, several local residents offered their own observations about Bob Starbuck and his impact on their own lives.

Gregory Kaufmann named the 20th Annual General Montgomery Day Parade Grand Marshall.

Greg was born on September 6, 1954, to Ann and the late Rodney "Bub" Kaufmann. He has lived in the Village of Montgomery all his life. He is the oldest of six children. two brothers: Brian and Bradley, and three sisters: Susan Wilson, Karen DuBois and Marybeth Turner. He graduated from Valley Central High School in 1972, and attended SUNY Delhi. In 1972-1973, Greg took up carpentry. In 1974 and 1975, Greg worked for Brescia Pole Buildings. When the economy and building slowed down in 1975, he went to work at the family business, Kaufmann's Service Center, where he worked until he retired in 2007.

In 1976, Greg married Stephanie Holladay, and they had three children: Gregory, Mark, and Marie. They became Grandparents when Ashton T. Kaufmann was born in 2004. Another grandchild was born in 2008, Gavin P. Moore, and they are expecting their third grandchild, a girl, in September.

Greg began his life in the Montgomery Fire Department in 1973, when Vince



Brescia talked him into joining the Fleet Hook & Ladder Company. In 1975 he became a Lieutenant and worked his way up through the ranks, Captain and Assistant Chief. He became Chief in 1984 and served until 1988. The Fire Department was under Village Government until 1988 when the Montgomery Fire District was formed. After serving as Chief, he served as Deputy Chief for many years.

Greg is currently the Treasurer of the Montgomery Fire Department and serves on the Board of Fire Commissioners. He is a Life Member of the Orange County

Fireman's Association and Past President of the Fire Chiefs Association of Orange County. Greg is also a Member of the New York State Association of Fire Chiefs and the Fireman's Association of New York. He has served on many of the New Truck Committees. He was Chairman for the New Ladder Truck Committee, and is currently serving as Chairman for the New Pumper-Tanker Truck. Greg has received all of the yearly awarded pins for membership in the Montgomery Fire Department for his service for the past thirty-six years. In March of 2009, he received the Vincent N. Brescia Memorial Award given out each year by the Board of Fire Commissioners. He is currently serving on the Board of Directors of the Orange County Firefighters Museum.

Greg has served the Village of Montgomery through his family business and the Montgomery Fire Department for most of his life, and we are proud to have him as Grand Marshall of the 20th Annual General Montgomery Day Parade.
